NAO is 58cm tall, autonomous, and fully programmable robot that can walk, talk, listen to you, and even recognise your face. NAO’s unique form and personality make it a powerful platform for engaging students from a variety of backgrounds in coding and robotics. The ability to script and program human-robot interactions, provides a hook for groups of students who traditionally may not be interested in coding.” We were sad to see him/her /it go but at around \$10,000 Concord was keen to get NAO back. He could also dance and sing Gangnam Style.
